

Colbert's award-winning book, Radical Vision: A Biography of Lorraine Hansberry. She has held fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities to support a residency at the Schomburg Center. Woodrow Wilson Foundation. Stanford University, Mellon Foundation, and the Robert W. Woodruff Library at Emory University. Colbert has also lectured nationally and internationally at universities, high schools, and middle schools as well as for civic and arts organizations. Colbert's writing has been featured in the **The New York** Times, Washington Post, Public Books, Metrograph and American Theatre. She has been interviewed on NPR and commented for the New York Times. USA Today. CNN. and the Washington Post. She is an Associate

Director at the Shakespeare Theatre Company in Washington, D.C. She has also served as a Creative Content Producer for The Public Theatre's audio play. shadow/land. Her research interests span the 19th-21st centuries, from Harriet Tubman to Beyoncé, and from poetics to performance.

The Coalition is a volunteer-driven group that creates innovative and inclusive opportunities that reflect the values and ideals by which Hansberry led her life.



Lynda is also a versatile, accomplished leader with experience collaborating with management and governing boards to develop strategies supporting corporate objectives and missions. She recently stepped down after over a decade as the Vice President for Human Resources and Strategic Planning for Historic Hudson Valley, one of Westchester County's most prominent cultural organizations. While there, in addition to serving on the corporate leadership team, she directed all aspects of human capital management and planning and led a series of successful multi-disciplinary efficiency projects.

Lynda has held executive positions in the for-profit, government, and nonprofit sectors, including Regional Director for Administration with Merit Behavioral Healthcare, Deputy Commissioner for Administration with the NYS Department of Labor, and Associate Executive Director with Services for the Underserved. She has also served as an independent consultant, designing and implementing systems resulting in the enhanced performance of individuals, teams, and organizations. A believer in the power of education, Lynda served six years as an elected member of the Board of Trustees of the high-performing Croton Harmon School District.

Lynda earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from Bernard M. Baruch College of CUNY and a master's degree in public administration, with a concentration in public finance, from New York University.

TEJASH V. SANCHALA was appointed Executive Director of the Westchester County Human Rights Commission in 2019. Under County Executive George Latimer's leadership, the County's Human Rights Commission has been revitalized. Mr. Sanchala and his team are responsible for enforcing and administering the County's Human Rights Law and Fair Housing Law as well as conducting education and outreach on these laws and hate and discrimination in all of its forms. In 2021, the Commission's jurisdiction was expanded to in-



clude pioneering protections against discriminatory harassment. Mr. Sanchala has spoken at many events on xenophobia, racism and other forms of discrimination, hate incidents, and about the importance of belonging and inclusion.

Prior to joining the Human Rights Commission, Mr. Sanchala was a skilled and sought-after civil rights attorney for over two decades in private practice with a focus on advancing justice in employment discrimination and housing discrimination matters. In this capacity, he successfully represented many clients in combatting discriminatory policies and practices. He is highly regarded in his field and has received many awards for his work. Most recently, he was recognized by Crain's magazine as a Notable Asian Leader. He is also a trained mediator and arbitrator. He has conducted trainings to many groups on discrimination, sexual harassment, diversity, equity and inclusion.

Mr. Sanchala, a long-time resident of Westchester County, has served in leadership roles on many boards and community organizations with the aim of bettering the community including but not limited to: serving as a former board member for the Westchester County Bar Association and as the current cochair of its Labor & Employment Law Section, serving as the former Chair of the Westchester County Fair Housing Board and co-authoring the Westchester County Fair Housing Law. He has been recognized for his pro bono legal services to underserved and marginalized communities in combating hate and discrimination and in advocating for workers' rights and securing unpaid wages. He has served as mock trial judge in competitions for law school students and high school students. He strongly believes in giving back to the community and has mentored many students in high school, college and law school.



ALVIN CLAYTON is

a Trinidad-born artist, restauranteur, and model. Alvin and his wife, Gwen, are the owners and operators of the awardwinning Southern and Caribbean Restaurant, *Alvin and*



Friends in New Rochelle, NY. Alvin's restaurant experience started with an investment partnership in the famed Georgia Restaurant, on the trendy Melrose Ave in Los Angeles, headed by Restauranteur Brad Johnson and several celebrities, including Denzel Washington, Norm Nixon, Debbie Allen, and other celebrities.

Alvin Clayton is a self taught artist. He is heavily influenced by Matisse and the French Impressionist movement. His paintings exudes bright bold colors of life in the African experience as it relates

to the pasted and present conditions. Alvin has had several groups and oneman shows featuring his work, most recently, *Alvin And Friends at the Rye Art Center*, in Rye, NY, and *Unapologetically Me: a virtual political show at Iona College's Brother Kennith Gallery*. His work has been featured at the Smithsonian Institute of African-American Art, has been featured in several films, including The Best Man Holiday, and has been collected by several celebrities, and collectors, including Ken and Kathy Chenault, New York University, Denzel Washington, Blair Underwood, Hill Harper, CC H. Pounder, Lorraine Toussaint, to name a few. Alvin's focus is now on being acquired by museums!

Gaining status as a "Super Model," Alvin's modeling career started at Wilhelmina Models and ended with the Ford Modeling Agency, just eight years ago.

With a well-rounded resume, Alvin has now been signed by the world-renowned IMG Models. Alvin and Gwen live in Westchester as partners in the restaurant; they have four kids and a dog and two cats.

CHRISTOPHER JOHN FARLEY C.J. Farley's young adult novel "Around Harvard Square" won an NAACP Image Award in 2020. He's the author of four other novels, including "Game World," "My Favorite War," "Kingston by Starlight," and his most recent release, "Zero O'Clock." Farley's nonfiction books include "Before the Legend: The Rise of Bob Marley," which was a finalist for a Hurston/Wright Legacy Award, and



the national bestseller "Aaliyah: More Than a Woman," which was adapted into a hit movie for Lifetime television. Farley co-wrote and co-edited the book "The Blues," the companion volume to Martin Scorsese's PBS documentary series, and served as a consulting producer on the Peabody-winning HBO documentary "Mr. Dynamite: The Rise of James Brown." Farley, a former senior editor for the Wall Street Journal and a former music critic for Time magazine, has interviewed some of the greatest musical artists in the world, including Aretha Franklin, Bob Dylan, Stevie Wonder, Joni Mitchell, Lauryn Hill, Adele, Beyoncé, Jay Z, Janelle Monáe and Taylor Swift. DEVAN SANDIFORD is a published writer, award-winning storyteller, and founder of Unreeling Storytelling—a Brooklynbased community providing space for people who quietly wait to speak and yet urgently need to be heard.

Raised in the wake of his Uncle Ron being fatally shot by the police outside of their Miami home, Devan spent his childhood and young adult years carrying his uncle's death in

silence everywhere he went. Then, feeling a voice within that was longing to be heard, Devan moved to Brooklyn, New York to push himself out of his comfort zone and find the power of his authentic voice. Stepping onto stages in New York City, New Jersey, Toronto, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Michigan, Virginia, and virtually all over the world, Devan has now shared more than 50 personal stories in front of sold-out crowds of up to 1200 people.

His stories have been featured in the Washington Post, The Moth Podcast and Radio Hour, Seattle NPR-affiliate KNKX, Speak Up Storytelling, Simple Families Podcast, Writing Class Radio, and many other outlets. One of his stories, *The Loudest Whisper*, was selected to air alongside a story told by Rev. Al Sharpton for Black History Month 2020—a podcast episode downloaded over 1.2 million times and in 49 different countries. Devan has also been interviewed about race and identity, parenting, storytelling, and grief for The New York Times and Washington Post. He is a Voices of Our Nations Arts Foundation (VONA) alumni and a recipient of the Corporeal Writing Scholarship for Writing Trauma Toward Healing and Joy with Terese Maria Mailhot.

Using his voice to speak truth to all the moments he carried in silence, Devan has received acclaim from multiple New York Times bestselling authors, including Roxane Gay, who said he was "an excellent writer who will be endlessly interesting to his readers", Terese Maria Mailhot, who remarked he "wills himself from one thought to the next with a work that has momentum and fluidity", and Nancy French, who shared he "has a unique perspective" and is "able to navigate the complicated issues facing modern America with a deft, compassionate touch."

Devan work as Senior Communications Officer, Story Developer, and Writer at The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and lives in Brooklyn, New York with his wife and their 11- and 8-year-old sons. He is working on his debut book—a memoir, currently titled: *The Silence We Carry: Confessions of a Six-year-old Man.*

a Bronx-based organizer, educator and facilitator with expertise in the history of systemic and structural inequality and strategies for racial equity and justice



through community reinvestment and economic democracy. He is an Adjunct Faculty member in the Department of Sociology and Anthropology at Fordham University where he focuses on the Bronx's history with redlining and grassroots approaches to systemic issues. Gregory's work at Banana Kelly **Community Improvement Association** in the South Bronx keeps him grounded in current campaigns and coalitions fighting back against the extractive economy, and fighting forward for community ownership and wealth building opportunities. He has extensive experience co-designing curricula. interactive exhibits. databases and popular education workshops. He is currently writing a book on the Bronx's battles against redlining while working to bring a community development credit union to the Bronx.

KEVIN R. FREE is a multidisciplinary artist whose work as a storyteller has been showcased many places, including Target Margin (2018), the Where Project (2015), QED: A Place for Storytelling (2014); on the *Moth Mainstage ("Heart of Darkness,"* 2012), Dana Rossi's *The Soundtrack Series*, Kathleen Warnock's *Drunken! Careening! Writers!* (2012). Kevin is currently the Artistic Director of Miles Square Theater in Hoboken, NJ.



As an actor, Kevin has appeared on television on Law & Order and Law & Order: SVU, Murphy Brown, Cyberchase, and in several national and regional commercials. In 2018, he made his feature film debut in Bo Burnham's Eighth Grade. New York audiences have seen Mr. Free Off-Broadway, playing the role of Bellomy in *The Fantasticks* (the first African-American to play the role in the New York Production's 54-year history). Berryman's WINNER, which was a Finalist in the Samuel French Off-Off-Broadway Short Play Festival. Mr. Free has also excelled as a producer and arts administrator. In 2018, he produced a borough-wide celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the original recording of Louis Armstrong's "What A Wonderful World" in Queens Libraries. He is the former Education Director of Queens Theatre in the Park, bringing arts to underserved communities in Queens. He is also the former Producing Artistic Director of The Fire This Time Festival, a platform for early career playwrights of the African Diaspora, winning an Obie for his efforts in 2015. He maintains a collaboration with Frigid New York as curator of QUEERLY, a multi-arts LGBTQ+ festival. He has a long-standing collaboration with Eevin Hartsough and Katie Rosin, with whom he co-wrote and produced the web series *Gemma & The Bear!* and the upcoming *BECKYS THROUGH HISTORY* (MyCarl.org).

Once a regular contributor the NPR show "News & Notes," Mr. Free's voice can now be heard on the popular podcast Welcome to Night Vale, as Kevin, the voice of Desert Bluffs. He was a singer on the World Premiere Recording of the musical Avenue X and is the narrator over 300 audio books, including Martha Wells' Murderbot Diaries; Victor LaValle's The Ballad of Black Tom; the Pulitzer Prize-winning The Known World (AudioFile Magazine Earphones Award, 2004) and Say You're One of Them (Oprah's Book Club) and Rick Riordan's The Kane Chronicles (Audie Award Finalist, Audiobook of the Year 2011).
